<u>Year One Curriculum</u> <u>Autumn Term: Marvellous Me</u>

Literacy – Talk for Writing

- Narrative: To retell a story using a text map, to use actions for time conjunctions, to quick write parts of text map.
 - ; to write a story in sentences; to edit sentences; to spell decodable words, to write in sentences using full stops and capital letters; to plan and write an original story.
 - Instructions: To follow and write instructions. To use imperative verbs and time connectives to order instructions.
- Phonics: To revise digraphs: qu, ch, sh, th, ng, ai, ee, igh, oa, oo, ar, or, ur, ow, oi, ear, air, ure, er. Mathematics
 - To count numbers to 10 accurately forwards and backwards; to write all numbers to 10 with numerals and in words; to understand what zero represents and use it when counting.
 - To compare different sets of objects and say which one has fewer, more or is equal; to order numbers to 10 and know which number is greater or is lesser in value; to compare different sets of objects and say which one has fewer, more or is equal.
 - To understand that a number is made up of other numbers; to understand a number can be made by adding two smaller numbers.
 - To add and subtract two different numbers within 10; to add by counting on from a given number; to be able to
 complete number sentences and to gain an understanding of inverse operations; to be able to make addition and
 subtraction stories using correct vocabulary; to be able to solve addition and subtraction problems through
 pictures.
 - To understand and use positional language including positions in a queue, left and right.

Computing

- To recognise common uses of information technology in school and beyond.
- To understand how to use computers safely.
- To begin to use computers to process information.

Science

- Ourselves: Identify, name, draw and label the basic parts of the human body. To say which part of the body is associated with each sense.
- Materials: Distinguish between an object and the material from which it is made. Identify and name a variety of everyday materials, including wood, plastic, glass, metal, water and rock. Describe the simple physical properties of a variety of everyday materials.

Geography/History

• Pupils should be taught about changes within living memory. Where appropriate, these should be used to reveal aspects of change in national life. (History)

• Pupils should be taught to use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to key human features, including city, town, village, farm, house, office, shop. (Geography)

Art

- Portraits: About the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work.
- To use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination.
- 3D models , clay, card, junk modelling

- To respond sensitively to my own and others' feelings about their special books, stories and writings.
- To identify the Bible as a special book for Christians and recognise that Bibles might look different but contain the same stories.
