Nature of Support 2016/17

Aims:

- Funding for Family Liaison Counsellors to support children's social, emotional and behavioural development.
- Funding for Speech and Language specialist to continue to support language development.
- Funding for Gym Trail to ensure children are focused and ready to learn.
- Enriching the curriculum through extra-curricular activities, theme events, educational visits and sporting activities.
- To provide targeted support through intervention groups and one to one tuition in order to accelerate the progress of identified pupils.
- Additional support from the Psychology and Learning Service for identified pupils with additional and complex needs, including those related to literacy and numeracy.
- Senior Leadership Team strategic release time to interrogate data, monitor progress, moderate and share best practice with other consortium schools
- Increase focus on more able pupils to ensure that they have a desire to achieve to the best of their ability.
- Wave 3 additional early literacy support to accelerate progress in reading and writing.
- Lunchtime sports clubs targeted at vulnerable pupils.
- Funding for trips and general activities.

Performance of disadvantaged pupils (DP)

At Wentworth Primary School we aim for all disadvantaged children (DP) to achieve the same level of progress as their non-disadvantaged peers.

The Disadvantaged Pupil Funding (previously Pupil Premium) is allocated to children from low income families who are in receipt of qualifying benefits and looked after /adopted children. Decisions about the allocation of Disadvantaged Pupil Funding are based around principles of equity, excellence and effectiveness.

The Disadvantaged Pupil Funding is used by the school to address any underlying inequalities between children by ensuring that funding reaches the pupils who are entitled. The impact in educational attainment from the expenditure of the Disadvantaged Pupil Funding is reflected in the results of the school, it also impacts on the positive behaviour of the children. The school has extensive monitoring and support systems in place to improve outcomes for all pupils, including those who are most vulnerable.

2016-17 Impact of Pupil Premium Funding – May 2017

In our Year 6 cohort there is a small percentage of pupil premium, each child is 1.7% of the cohort, in total the 6 pupils make 10% of the year group. The percentage of pupils who have Pupil Premium has dropped considerably from 2015/16 in year 6.

Since September many barriers to learning have been overcome for these individuals, with strategies such as: counselling, improved attendance, pastoral care and one to one/small group tuition.

Predictions for this group of pupils achieving expected or above in Reading, Writing and Maths will diminish the gap from 2016 results.

In other year groups the progress of Pupil Premium children has been a focus in termly review meetings and book scrutinies.

At Key Stage 2 internal data indicates that all pupil premium are making progress towards age related expectations, 58% are currently making expected progress or above with 23% making accelerated progress. Those at risk of not achieving have Person Centred Support Plans and interventions in place to support their needs, these are closely monitored and shared with families.

At Key Stage 1 (12 pupils) 75% are making expected progress or above and 17% are making accelerated progress. This impact is due to the structured phonics teaching in Foundation Year 1 and 2, the introduction of the structured teaching of Maths No Problem at KS1. This will begin to impact on KS2 and is already evident in lower KS2.
